

Sports writing | Terrin Waack | Nichols Room

A sports reporter for The Tuscaloosa News and Tide Sports will show you how to get great interviews. Be prepared to quiz her about the inside story and ask for career tips.

In this case study, staffers will analyze a crowd-pleasing and award-winning yearbook from start to finish. Explore theme concept, coverage, writing, photography, design and marketing/selling.

Multimedia storytelling | Bobby Mathews and Misty Mathews | Rast A

This session will delve into multimedia feature storytelling and how to make feature stories come to life for the reader/viewer.

For all publication genres, photography can make or break the immediate impression of your coverage. Careful planning, exhaustive shooting and effective designing requires attention to detail. It's a team effort between editors, photographers, writers and designers.

Editorial writing | Don Brown | Nichols Room

The editorial is an opinion piece. It must be thoughtful in stating your opinion about an issue. Give all sides and justify your position. Spelling, grammar, clarity, proper sentence structure are absolutes.

How to prepare for soliciting literary magazine submissions, designing, and selecting content for theme issues.

Resources to improve your sports broadcasting | Brandon Kamerman | Rast BTake your broadcast sports reporting to the next level with tips from a pro. Get past bland play-by-play and stale color commentary and do what works for your school.

The art of the interview | Bobby Mathews and Misty Mathews | Rast A

Think of interviewing as a conversation rather than a (sometimes nerve-inducing!) chore. In this session students will discover how to approach interviews with joy (and a lot of preparation!).

KEYNOTE SPEAKER: DR. DARRIN GRIFFIN is an assistant professor in the Department of Communication Studies at The University of Alabama and the director of the College of Communication & Information Sciences (C&IS) Human Communication Research Lab. Griffin's research focuses on interpersonal communication contexts – specifically deception. Recently, he has led an effort to increase accessibility for the deaf at The University of Alabama and has conducted trainings on effective law enforcement interactions with the deaf community.

He was the original reporter covering the investigation of the "Torso Murders" in 1959 for The Birmingham News, and is now writing a book about the case. Emmett is on faculty with the Ada Long Creative Writing Workshop, a 3-week day-camp for high school students held at UAB every June. His poetry has appeared in Aura and Black Napkin Press.

Prior to his time at WVUA 23, Brandon was the weekend sports anchor/reporter at KDRV-TV in Medford, Ore. He has also worked as a play-by-play announcer and studio host for Fox Sports Arizona. MISTY MATHEWS is a lead communications specialist at BBVA Compass, where she mostly handles employee communications. She's previously been a communications and media relations specialist for the University of Alabama, managing editor of Truckers News magazine, and a reporter for the Troy Messenger.
